"But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep." - 1 Corinthians 15:20

Dear brothers and sisters in Risen Lord, Christ Jesus: Peace and grace to you all from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Since we celebrated Easter Sunday a month ago, we have now entered into the great season of Eastertide for fifty days until Pentecost on 19th of May. We indeed are sons and daughters of New Life. The Lord Jesus, through his cross and resurrection, has destroyed the power of sin and death and brought us into His life. Christ has won for us victory over the grave.

As we see this world, we could easily hear bad and sad news from all around the world about conflicts, wars, terrors, hatred, fear, refuge, discrimination and so on, even though the King of kings and peace came to us as we waved palm branches. We know that Easter is so much more than flowers, cards, Easter eggs, and even beautiful music. It is the historical event that gives ultimate meaning and purpose to our lives. Because Jesus died and rose from the dead, we no longer have to fear sin and death. The victory has been won in Christ. But do we live a victorious life? Is victory yours? Resurrection is not something that we see every day.

In fact, it's something that we have never seen, only experienced. It has only happened once in the history of the world, two thousand years ago. So if a crucified world is to know resurrection, we Christians must practice it. We must think of new ways to bring the power of Easter to this world. We must act it out daily. We must become channels and conduits of the love and energy of the Almighty God. We are to proclaim that death – in all its forms – is not the final word. As we are citizens of heaven (Philippians 3:20), we are called to be heralds of God's incredible power, love and grace.

Thus to practice resurrection is to put the power of Easter into our lives; it is to live in the way that Jesus commanded us to live. It is to love our enemies: both our corporate enemies and our personal enemies. Practicing resurrection means to love all of these. And loving them also means praying for them. This is easier said than done, and it's not humanly possible. But it is like God, and God can transform us if we desire it.

At this point, we need faith of Jesus Christ. We are called to build bridges between gaps, differences, discrimination, tensions, and so forth. Practicing resurrection is also not repaying evil for those who do us evil: "*Do not rejoice when your enemy meets trouble. Let there be no gladness when he falls*." (Proverbs 24:17).

I invite you to hear the words of Clarence Jordan who founded *Koinonia Farm* in Kentucky which eventually birthed Habitat for Humanity International under the leadership of Millard Fuller, who was deeply inspired by Clarence: "*The proof that God raised Jesus from the dead is not the empty tomb, but the full hearts of his transformed disciples. The crowning evidence that he lives is not a vacant grave, but a spirit-filled fellowship. Not a rolled-away stone, but a carried-away church.*"

This Easter season, I cordially invite you to give it a try: practice resurrection. Who knows what it will look like. May God bless you all.

The fourth, fifth, and sixth centuries rumbled with prolonged controversy about the nature of Christ, and numerous councils convened to grapple with this issue.

The Council of Nicaea in 325 said that *Christ was fully divine*. Fifty years later, the Council of Constantinople proclaimed *Christ fully human*. The Council of Chalcedon in 451 formulated the famous creed that Christ is "*truly God and truly man… two natures without confusion, without change, without division, or without separation*…."

On this day in Christian history, **May 5, 553**, another council was convoked, this one by Emperor Justinian in Constantinople. Justinian, brilliant and tireless, longed to be religious. He spent many nights in prayer and fasting, and endless days in theological study. He built the fabulous cathedral of Hagia Sophia and spoke longingly of a unified church.

But Justinian was also vain, ambitious, ostentatious, and easily influenced. His beautiful wife Theodora, daughter of a bear trainer, was ruthless, and she played him like a marionette. Unable to understand the two natures of Christ, she held the Monophysite view—that Jesus had no human nature but possessed only a divine nature, clothed somehow in human flesh. At the Council of Constantinople, Justinian, manipulated by his wife, issued a decree favorable to the Monophysites.



Pope Vigilius had refused to attend the council due to fear for his safety and because of the preponderance of Eastern bishops. In Rome he received news of the council's actions with disdain but eventually accepted its decisions as unimportant. Monophysite views, however, continue to this day in Abyssinia, Syria, and in the Coptic church of Egypt.

And Justinian? He eventually became a full-fledged heretic, preaching that the body of Christ, being incorruptible, could not have experienced suffering and death. He

died in 565, unrepentant, at age 83, his later years darkened by perpetual disasters.

Healthy Christianity demands both a correct theological knowledge of Christ and a personal knowledge of the Savior through faith and obedience. Justinian grappled with the former, never arrived at the latter, and makes us wonder what the Lord thinks of his title in history—Justinian the Great.

"In the beginning was the one who is called the Word. The Word was with God and was truly God. From the very beginning the Word was with God. And with this Word, God created all things. Nothing was made without the Word." - John 1:1-3a

The mission outreach committee continues to focus on ways that we can support each other to be Disciples of Christ. We feel that this is primarily accomplished by our church providing everyone opportunities to serve others in our community and abroad.

Most recently our primary effort has been getting Dinner Church launched. We've been going now for 6 weeks and are pleased with the response from the community. On average we serve about 90 meals each week. Numbers vary but there seems to be a near equal number of people that "eat in" versus "take out". We have been collecting information to evaluate our program's effectiveness at reaching our mission. We will be having a meeting soon to review this information and make adjustments as needed. As always, your constructive feedback is always welcome.

On Sunday May 5 will be the blessing of the sweaters and other items to wrap up our Knit for Kids project for the year. As items are still coming in I do not have a final count at this time but we will reach over 100 for sure. Last day to get things to church for shipment will be May 10. Thank you to everyone that has contributed to this project either by donating yarn, knitting or crocheting. A special thank you goes out to The Bunko Club who have donated \$60 to help defray our shipping costs and the Evangelical Lutheran Church for additional yarn. Remember we accept donations of yarn year round, so as you spring clean or go to garage sales please pick it up.

On April 17 we joined efforts with HCE of Jackson County to make pillow case dresses for Marcia Hagen to take with her on her next medical mission trip to Guatemala. That day we were able to make 8 dresses but there will be more as some ladies took 2 or more home to put together before the deadline of May 15. If you wish to contribute, there are some kits available in the gathering area. Just have them back to me by the May 15 deadline. We are always in need of double fold bias tape. This is used to make the ties at the shoulders. Donations of bias tape are needed and deeply appreciated. As always, be looking for gently used cotton pillow cases too.

We have had some conversations about how we might further support those in our community that are homeless or unhoused. Though none on our committee now are part of the task force that is looking at this issue, we keep abreast of their progress. On a church level though we feel that we could help out by having a few essential personal needs items available at church on Wednesday to people to take if they like. We know the items are available at the food pantry as well but we feel that some may prefer smaller travel size items as they are easier to carry with them from place to place. If you have some items that you would like to donate, place them in the small tote in the gathering area. Another way that we thought we could help was by making sleeping mats out of plastic garbage bags. This is a great way to use and recycle and help out others plus people of many ages can participate in this. As it takes between 500-700 bags to make a mat we are going to start. **Clean bags**, Walmart or Hansen's type are needed though any type can be used. The bin once used for Sleep in Heavenly Peace will be in the gathering area for you to place bags in.



A big thank you to everyone that has helped to make the garden come alive. It was a great turnout especially considering the weather. Everyone is coming together to help with this. The Men's Group is funding the bulk of the project, The Youth and Women's Groups are involved. It is really great to see the coordinated effort by all.

Thanks to Dave Olson for donating most of the wood for the benches. Additionally, Joe was able to get a donation from the Scotts / Miracle-Gro Company of 20 bags each of Raised bed soil and potting mix which saved us about \$600.00. We had a very good Earth Day Celebration on the 20th. Thanks to Katrina for organizing that and for procuring the signs. Thanks to the Youth for having the kids projects and making plant label signs for the garden. Thanks to Paul and Hoffman Construction for the use of the drill truck for putting the fence posts in.

Our next step is to get the neighborhood excited and involved. Spread the word, personally invite someone. You may know someone that could enjoy volunteering and supplementing their food with fresh produce. Volunteer times are on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays. Harvest days will be Wednesdays and Saturdays. More information on volunteering will be out soon.

Next scheduled work day will be on **May 4th at 10:00** weather permitting. We will need to obtain some more soil for the benches and plant some cold weather crops.
